Dr Vanishree MR welcomed all the faculty members and the resource person of the Day 4 Technical session 5. Followed by, Dr Seethalaxmi started welcoming and introducing the resource person- Dr. Vathsala Mohan, who delivers a talk on Theatre Based Learning and Moral for Life. The main aim of this session is to investigate how Theatre based learning might be utilised to teach moral principles and practical life skills, equipping students to successfully negotiate challenging social and ethical environments. This approach uses dramatisation, roleplaying, and narrative to emotionally and intellectually engage students and promote deeper understanding and ethical development.

**Story of Kailasam-** Enactment by **Mr Sreedhar:** The story of Kailasam revolves around a central character who faces numerous moral challenges and must make difficult decisions that test his values and principles. The story is intertwined with themes of moral courage, justice, compassion, and integrity. Kailasam provides valuable lessons in ethical behaviour through his persistent dedication to integrity, his pursuit of justice, and his capacity for empathy towards others—even those who caused harm to him. His story is an effective tool for discussing and meditating on moral issues.

### Implementation of Theatre-Based Learning

To implement Theatre-Based Learning, faculty members participated in some of the activities in the FDP. Kailasam's story was brought to life through storytelling, and improvisation activities promoted rapid thinking and adaptation. Deeper examination of themes and character development was made possible by scripted performances of significant story moments. Following these exercises, participants engaged in reflection and discussion sessions where they exchanged ideas and applied the lessons learned from the story to actual circumstances.

Finally, the session concluded with some of the discussions where Implementing Theatre-Based Learning presents certain challenges. It requires a lot of resources and takes a lot of time and energy to plan and carry out. Since teachers need certain abilities to effectively facilitate TBL activities, teacher training is essential. It's important to create a welcoming and encouraging environment because some students may be uncomfortable participating in theatrical activities at initially. It might be difficult and subjective to evaluate students' learning and moral development through Theatre based learning, thus evaluation strategies must be carefully chosen. In order to successfully incorporate Theatre based learning into current curriculum, careful preparation and alignment with academic standards are also necessary.

Followed by, Dr. Farzana Tasneem MI, started welcoming and introducing the resource person- Dr. Beena G, who delivers a talk on Designing Quality Question Paper and Effective Rubrics. The main aim of this session is to enhance the assessment skills of educators. By focusing on these key aspects, the session sought to improve the quality and effectiveness of evaluations, question paper setting by ensuring that they accurately measure student learning outcomes and promote deeper understanding.

	feedback. It guarantees evaluations that are transparent,
	equitable, and consistent.

Finally, the session with Q & A by providing comprehensive insights into the assessment process, from understanding the broader educational landscape to the detailed steps involved in creating effective assessment tools in the educational sector.

Followed by Valedictory, were Dr Vanishree MR, discussed in detail about the five days FDP event with a small description of each day session.




